A Look Back at June

It was hot and sweaty work, but the flag retirement ceremony on 14 June was a roaring success! The partnership we created with the Prince William County Fire Department enables us to use their Public Safety Training Center to safely and respectfully retire a huge number of flags very efficiently. The ceremony and flag retirement of the 2,000 flags took just over 30 minutes to complete. Many thanks to all who took part in the ceremony and the work that followed it. The plan going forward is to do an annual flag retirement event at the training facility on or around Flag Day.

The VFW Bylaws state 7 purposes that we use as our organization's mission statement, the first of which reads, "to preserve and strengthen comradeship among its members." That is the core reason we are reinstituting the 'no reason parties' (NRP). These small events are intended to bring together our members, Auxiliary, friends, and family to enjoy food,





drink, and entertainment, and to foster comradery. The first NRP, held on Saturday 14 June, was a success. The kitchen did a great job putting together some very tasty BBQ and if you didn't get to try the brisket, you missed out! Virginia: Historic Triangle Celebrations

The Historic Triangle – Yorktown, Jamestown, and Williamsburg – will host events commemorating Virginia's pivotal role in the American Revolution. On July 4, 2025, Colonial Williamsburg will feature a reading of the Declaration of Independence, fife and drum marches, and fireworks at the Governor's Palace. This living history museum offers a glimpse into Revolutionary-era life, perfect for veterans and families. Visit www.colonialwilliamsburg.org for tickets and schedules.

In Yorktown, the Yorktown Battlefield (part of the National Park Service) will host ranger-led tours highlighting the 1781 Siege of Yorktown, a decisive Revolutionary War victory. Check www.nps.gov/york for event details. Jamestown Settlement will offer living-history demonstrations, showcasing early colonial and military life. More information is available at www.historyisfun.org

Maryland: Civil War and Beyond

On July 20-21, 2025, the Union Mills Civil War Encampment in Westminster, Maryland, will feature reenactments, artillery demonstrations, and camp life displays. This event brings the Civil War era to life with engaging activities for all ages. Visit www.unionmills.org for details.

The Antietam National Battlefield near Sharpsburg offers self-guided tours of the 1862 battle site, one of the bloodiest days in American history. While specific July events are pending, the visitor center provides maps and audio tours year-round. Check www.nps.gov/anti for updates.

Washington, D.C.: Capital Commemorations

Washington, D.C., hosts several military history events in July 2025. The National Museum of the United States Army at Fort Belvoir (just outside D.C.) will likely feature special exhibits tied to the Army's 250th anniversary. Explore artifacts from the Revolutionary War to modern conflicts. Visit www.thenmusa.org for exhibit schedules.

On July 4, the National Mall will host the annual Independence Day celebration, including a concert and fireworks. Military bands, such as the U.S. Army Band, may perform, honoring the nation's heritage. Check www.nps.gov/subjects/nationalmall4th for updates. The Smithsonian's National Air and Space Museum offers free exhibits on military aviation history, ideal for a self-paced visit. More details at www.si.edu/museums/air-and-space-museum

After years-long delay, missile tracking radar test declared a success

After a delay of nearly two years, the Missile Defense Agency has declared a successful test of its Long-Range Discrimination Radar’s ability to track a live ballistic missile target.

In a June 23 test, the LRDR at Clear Space Force Station, Alaska, “successfully acquired, tracked and reported missile target data to the Command and Control Battle Management and Communications (C2BMC),” according to a recent MDA announcement. “This was the radar’s first flight test tracking a live Intercontinental Ballistic Missile (ICBM) representative target.”

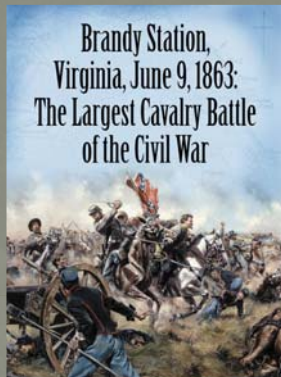

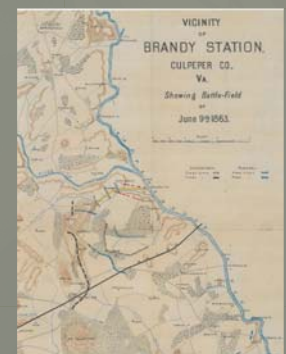

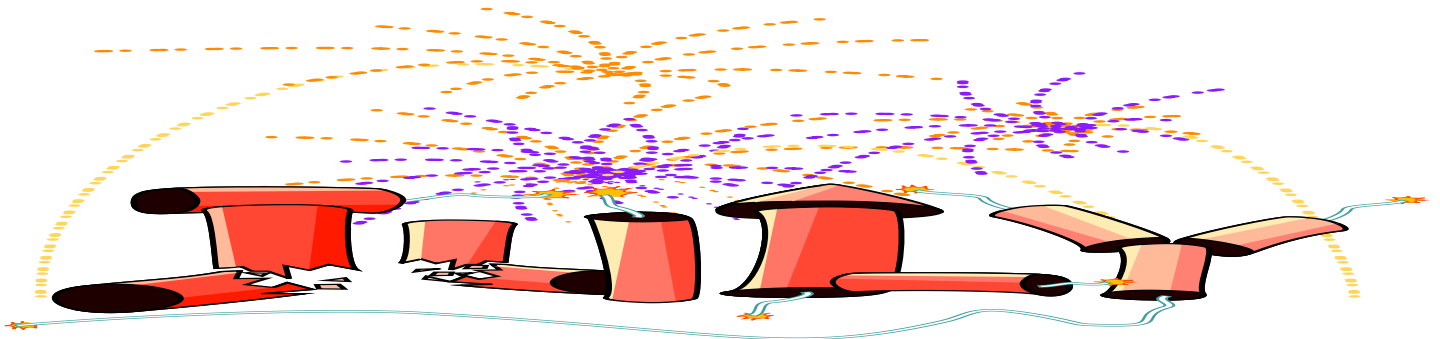
