MILITARY ORDER PURPLE HEART

June 14th

June 14th is a special day in the history of our country for two reasons separated by two years!



Happy Birthday to the US Army!

The Continental Army was created by the Second Continental Congress on June 14th 1775. They desired a uniformly organized, trained, and equipped single army instead of 13 separate colonial militias of varying organization and training and levels of equipping that had to be released by their governors to join campaigns in the fight against Great Britain for our independence. Since its founding, the Army has been called upon to defend our country, explore it, and help recover from natural disasters.

Today, the U.S. Army's mission is to deploy, fight and win our nation's wars by securing ready, prompt and sustained land dominance by Army forces across the full spectrum of conflict as part of the joint force.

Happy Birthday Old Glory!

On June 14th 1777, the Second Continental Congress approved the Flag Resolution that stated the flag of the Thirteen United States would consist of thirteen stripes, alternating red and white and there would be a blue field with thirteen white stars representing new constellation. Even with the description in the resolution, there were many different flags created that met these requirements, two examples are shown below. As the US added States, our flag added stars and stripes for each. This quickly grew unsustainable so the decision was made to limit the stripes to 13 to represent the original 13 states and then each state got a star as it joined the country. An American Flag Day Society was created in 1886 and after 30 years of speeches and events across the country honoring our flag, President Woodrow Wilson declared June 14 Flag Day in 1916. The 50th star was added to our flag on July 4, 1960 to recognize Hawaii becoming a state. Flag Day is not an official federal holiday, but there are observances across the country that will include speeches, the recitation of the Pledge of Allegiance, the singing of the National Anthem and parades. The President of the United States frequently issues a proclamation in honor of Flag Day.

POST HISTORIAN'S ARCHIVE

VFW Post 1503 Battlefield Tours to Virginia's newest State Park, Culpeper Battlefield is now approved for September 27, 2025. Kelly Behm will post links in the future for you to sign up for the tour. You will need to wear comfortable clothes and shoes for some short walking, as well as bring your own refreshments. You will also be provided a small map packet to follow during the tour.

Our Morning tour, the Battle of Brandy Station, will consist of three bus stops with some walking. It was fought on June 9, 1863, in Culpeper County, Virginia, was the largest cavalry engagement of the American Civil War and marked a turning point in the conflict's mounted operations. Union cavalry under Brigadier General Alfred Pleasonton launched a surprise attack on Confederate forces led by Major General J.E.B. Stuart, aiming to disrupt Confederate plans and gather intelligence before the Gettysburg Campaign. The battle saw intense, day-long fighting with nearly 20,000 cavalymen clashing in mounted and dismounted combat. Although tactically inconclusive, with both sides claiming victory, the Union cavalry's performance demonstrated its growing skill and confidence, challenging the previously dominant Confederate cavalry and setting the stage for more aggressive Union mounted operations.

We will stop for lunch in historical Culpeper VA. Culpeper, founded in 1759, is a historic town steeped in American history, named after Lord Thomas Culpeper, a colonial governor. Initially a hub for trade and agriculture, it played a significant role during the Revolutionary War and Civil War, with its strategic location making it a contested site, notably during the Battle of Culpeper Court House in 1863. The town's charming downtown, with several family-owned cafes in its well-preserved 18th and 19th-century architecture, reflects its rich past, while its proximity to major battlefields and historic sites continues to draw visitors. Culpeper's vibrant history blends seamlessly with its modern small-town allure.

We will conclude our tour in the afternoon at the Battle of Cedar Mountain which consists of a one-mile walking tour over two hours with several stops. It was fought on August 9, 1862, in Culpeper County, Virginia, was a significant engagement during the American Civil War's Second Bull Run Campaign. Confederate forces under Major General Thomas "Stonewall" Jackson clashed with Union troops led by Major General Nathaniel Banks. Despite initial Union success in pushing back Confederate lines, Jackson's timely reinforcements and aggressive counterattacks turned the tide, forcing Banks' forces to retreat. The battle resulted in approximately 2,300 Union and 1,400 Confederate casualties and solidified Jackson's reputation for tactical brilliance, setting the stage for the larger Second Battle of Bull Run later that month.

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

Memorial Day 2025

This past weekend our nation paused and remembered the military personnel who have died in the line of duty. Volunteers placed American flags on the graves of those military personnel in national cemeteries. Likewise, our post handed out Buddy Poppies throughout our community.

The “Buddy” Poppy is an integral part of the VFW community and has been the VFW’s official memorial flower since 1922. It represents the blood shed by American service members and reiterates the VFW will not forget their sacrifices. The Poppy movement was inspired by Canadian Army Col. John McCrae’s famous poem, “In Flanders Fields.” The term “Buddy” was coined by the poppy makers, who, at the time, were disabled veterans, as a tribute to the veterans who did not come home and those disabled or scarred for life.

A decade and a half before Memorial Day became a federal holiday in 1971, Billy Graham was in Boston to deliver a memorial address to the Veterans of Foreign Wars. The year was 1955, and he had just finished visiting many U.S. military installations in Europe. Below are some excerpts of his timeless message, which still ring true this Memorial Day as we remember with gratitude the sacrifices of so many for our nation:

In all the American idiom, there is no more endearing word than “buddy.” It is warm, with intonations of friendship, brotherhood and common purpose. We are assembled today to pay tribute to those, our “buddies,” who poured out their full measure of devotion upon the altar of freedom.

Thousands of you gathered here could tell dramatic stories of heroism which you yourself have seen acted out by your buddies on the grim stage of war’s theater. They have left this realm of time and space, but the sacred memory of their selflessness and the freedom they died to obtain will live forever.

The freedoms we enjoy, the freedoms we take so much for granted, the freedoms we so often trifle with were bought not by the gold of our millionaires, nor altogether the genius of our scientists, nor the sacrifices of the people at home, but primarily by the blood, sweat and agony of those whose names on this day we honor – those who died that we might live!

Let those who want “peace at any price” remember this day – that thousands have died for honor and freedom, and that what we have today has come at the price of shed blood. They have handed us a torch, and we have a responsibility to see that they have not died in vain.

Yes, the bells of liberty ring in America today because these men we honor today got through for us. The sacred memory of their sacrifice will always live in our hearts, and we have a sacred and holy trust – and we cannot fail them!

PRAYER: Heavenly Father, Almighty God, we are blessed to live in a nation of brave men and women who have sacrificed greatly for our country. Father, we pause to reflect on the sacrifice made by those who paid the ultimate price on behalf of our nation. We pray that their sacrifices are never forgotten, nor is the pain of their families. Remind me daily that my freedom came at a price someone else paid. Amen

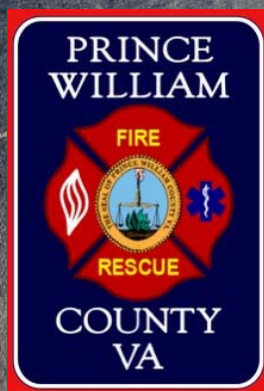
WWII Bomber Crash Left 11 Dead and 'Non-Recoverable.' 4 Are Finally Coming Home

WAPPINGERS FALLS, N.Y. (AP) — As the World War II bomber Heaven Can Wait was hit by enemy fire off the Pacific island of New Guinea on March 11, 1944, the co-pilot managed a final salute to flyers in an adjacent plane before crashing into the water.

All 11 men aboard were killed. Their remains, deep below the vast sea, were designated as non-recoverable.

Yet four crew members' remains are beginning to return to their hometowns after a remarkable investigation by family members and a recovery mission involving elite Navy divers who descended 200 feet (61 meters) in a pressurized bell to reach the sea floor.

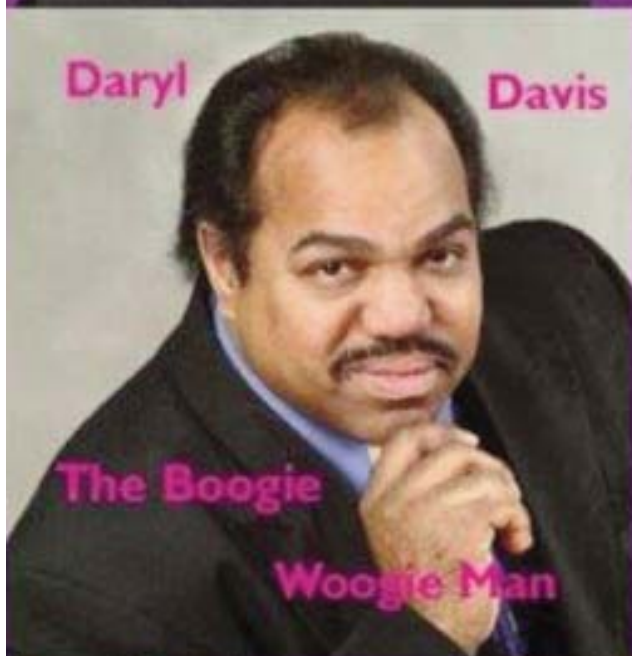
